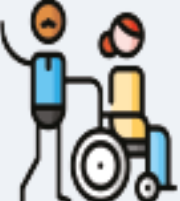
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DEFINITION AND MEASUREMENT OF CPI AND INFLATION RATE

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a macroeconomic indicator that provides a general measure of changes in the average prices of goods and services commonly purchased by consumers relative to a base period (price reference period is 2024). The Consumer inflation rate is directly computed from the index. The inflation rate is the relative change in CPI between periods. The inflation rate is reported year-on-year (annual inflation rate) and month-on-month (monthly inflation rate). CPI is constructed using the following key variables: weights derived from estimates of household expenditures (the weight reference period is 2023), Prices collected from selected retail outlets across the 36 States and FCT (both urban and rural), and Quantities of goods and services. In the current CPI, there are 74 population strata, which are the urban and rural parts of Nigeria's 36 states and the FCT. The CPI basket has 242 items strata, defined by the 2018 version of the Classification of Individual Consumption According to Purpose (COICOP). The 2018 version of COICOP has 4 levels in its hierarchy: DIVISIONS, GROUPS, CLASSES and SUB-CLASSES.

HEADLINE INFLATION FOR JUNE 2026

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) increased to 143.0 in June 2026, reflecting a 2.3-point increase from the preceding month (140.7).

In June 2026, the Headline inflation rate was 15.91%, down from 15.93% in May 2026 and stood at 25.29% in the same month of the preceding year (June 2025). Looking at the movement, the June 2026 Headline inflation rate showed a decrease of 0.02% compared to the May 2026 Headline inflation rate.

On a month-on-month basis, the Headline inflation rate in June 2026 was 1.66%, which was 0.09% lower than the rate recorded in May 2026 (1.75%). This means that in June 2026, the rate of increase in the average price level was lower than the rate of increase in the average price level in May 2026.

The percentage change in the average CPI for the twelve months ending June 2026 over the average for the previous twelve-month period was 17.63%, showing a 12.18% decrease compared to 29.82% recorded in June 2025.

DISAGGREGATION OF JUNE 2026 INFLATION RATE

URBAN INFLATION

On a year-on-year basis, in June 2026, the Urban inflation rate was 16.08%. On a month-on-month basis, the Urban inflation rate in June 2026 was 2.13%, up by 0.14% compared to May 2026 (1.99%). The corresponding twelve-month average for the Urban inflation rate was 17.51% in June 2026. This was 14.14% points lower compared to the 31.64% recorded in June 2025.

RURAL INFLATION

The Rural inflation rate in June 2026 was 15.48% on a year-on-year basis. On a month-on-month basis, the Rural inflation rate in June 2026 was 0.52%, down by 0.64% compared to May 2026 (1.17%). The corresponding twelve-month average for the Rural inflation rate in June 2026 was 17.54%. This was 10.11% points lower compared to the 27.65% recorded in June 2025.



HEADLINE CPI IN JUNE 2026

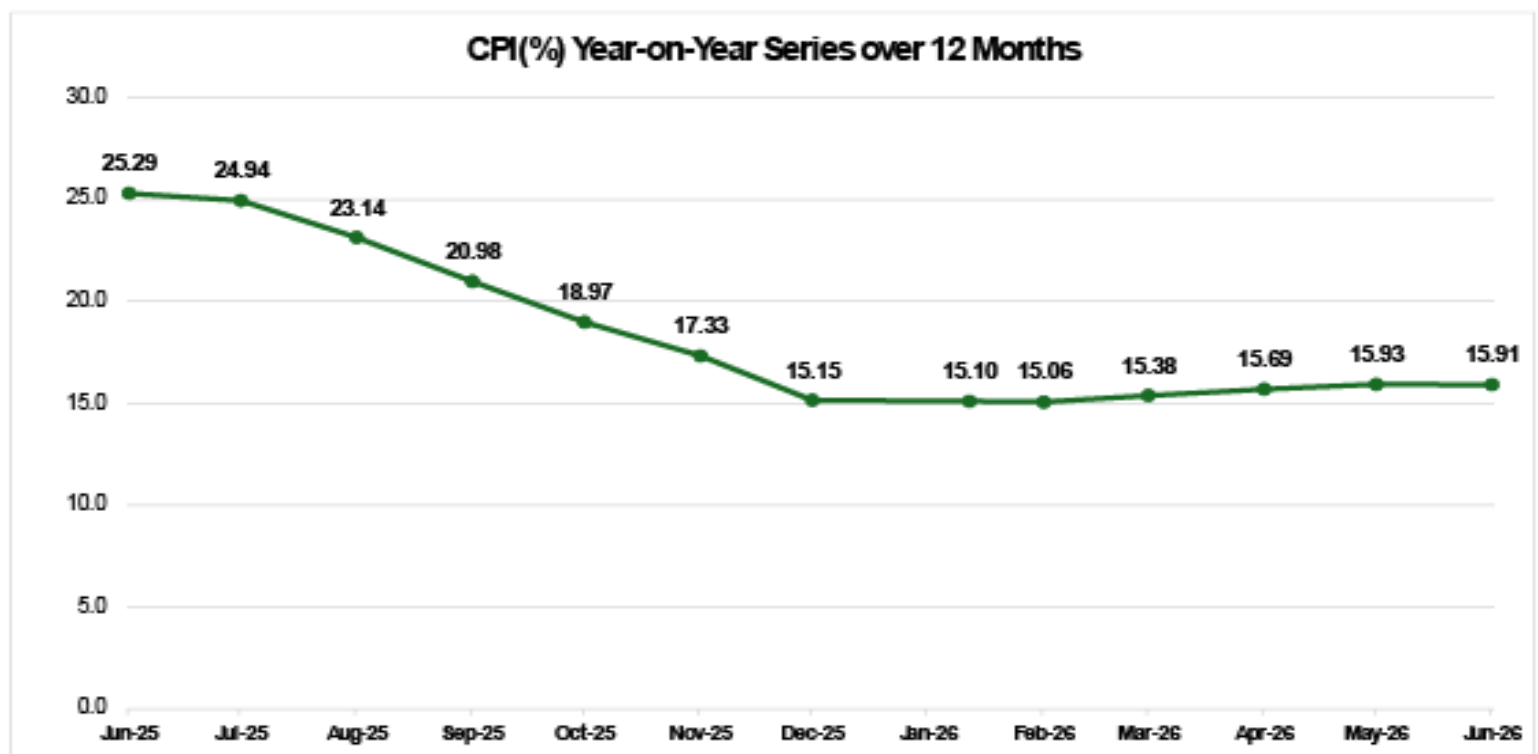

FOOD INFLATION

The Food inflation rate in June 2026 was 17.52% on a year-on-year basis and stood at 25.41% in the same month of the preceding year (June 2025). On a month-on-month basis, the Food inflation rate in June 2026 was 3.75%, up by 0.77% points from May 2026 (2.98%). This can be attributed to the rate of change in the average prices of the following products: Crayfish, Pepper (Fresh), Tomatoes (Fresh), Green Peas (dried), Fresh Pepper, Yam Flour (Sold loose), Water Yam, Beef, Banana, Cassava Flour, Cow Pea, Garri, Irish Potatoes, Yam Tuber, etc.

The average annual food inflation rate for the twelve months ending June 2026 over the previous twelve-month average was 16.42%, which was 15.51% points lower compared with the average annual rate of change recorded in June 2025 (31.93%).

ALL ITEMS LESS FARM PRODUCE AND ENERGY (CORE INFLATION)

The “All items less farm produces and energy” or Core inflation, which excludes the prices of volatile agricultural produces and energy, stood at 15.92% in June 2026 on a year-on-year basis; showing a decline of 9.49% when compared to the 25.41% recorded in June 2025. On a month-on-month basis, the Core Inflation rate was 1.66% in June 2026, down by 0.28% compared to May 2026 (1.94%). The percentage change in the average CPI for the twelve months ending June 2026 over the average for the previous twelve-month period was 18.82%, which was 8.05% points lower than the 26.88% recorded in June 2025.

STATE PROFILES

When analysing price movements under this section, it is essential to note that the CPI is weighted by consumption expenditure patterns that vary across States and locations. Accordingly, the weight assigned to a particular Food or Non-Food item may differ from State to State, making interstate comparisons of consumption baskets inadvisable and potentially misleading.

All Items Inflation

In June 2026, the All-Items inflation rate on a Year-on-Year basis was highest in Niger (42.23%), Kogi (41.59%), and Abuja (39.91%), while Imo (19.47%), Ebonyi (20.79%) and Katsina (21.87%) recorded the lowest rise in Headline inflation on a Year-on-Year basis. On a Month-on-Month basis, however, June 2026 recorded the highest increases in Niger (11.65%), Katsina (8.13%) and Kwara (7.52%), while Bayelsa (-6.48%), Benue (-5.58%), and Cross River (-5.12%) recorded the lowest rise in the Month-on-Month inflation.

Food Inflation

In June 2026, Food inflation on a Year-on-Year basis was highest in Kogi (53.02%), Niger (43.83%), and Benue (40.83%), while Katsina (19.15%), Rivers (23.81%) and Imo (24.60%) recorded the slowest rise in Food inflation on a Year-on-Year basis. On a Month-on-Month basis, however, June 2026 Food inflation was highest in Katsina (16.82%), Kebbi (9.79%) and Niger (8.96%), while Borno (-3.54%), Benue (-2.36%), and Bayelsa (-1.34%) recorded the slowest rise in Food inflation on a Month-on-Month basis.
